# **Prepare Your Pipes for Cold Weather**

Winter can bring beautiful snow, but it also brings a greater risk What to Do If You Suspect a Frozen Pipe: to your home's pipes. When the water inside a pipe freezes, it expands—this can lead to bursting pipes and unexpected headaches for you and your family.

Let's take steps together to protect your home and keep things running smoothly:

- 1. Watch out for cold spots. Pay special attention to pipes that are outside, exposed to cold air, or located along outside walls. Pipes in basements or crawl spaces are especially vulnerable when temperatures drop.
- 2. Set your thermostat no lower than 60°F to keep your home warm enough to prevent freezing.
- 3. Let your faucets drip slightly during extremely low temperatures. This small flow of water can help keep pipes from freezing.
- 4. Open cabinet doors under sinks to let warm air reach the pipes.
- 5. Empty your taps by finding your water shut-off valve and turning it off. After closing the valve, unscrew garden hoses and open your outside taps to drain any leftover water.
- 6. Seal drafty spots where cold air could reach your pipes, like around windows, exterior walls, or cracked foundations. This helps keep the cold out and the warmth in.
- 7. Wrap exposed pipes in basements or crawl spaces with foam insulation, heat tape, or low-wattage pipe heaters to give them extra protection.

If you think a pipe may have frozen, it's important to act quickly and gently thaw it to prevent it from bursting.

- 1. Identify the frozen section—this is often near an exterior wall or where the water line enters your home.
- 2. Leave a cold water tap open downstream from the frozen area. This helps you know when the pipe has thawed and allows water to flow smoothly.
- 3. Apply gentle heat using an electric heating pad, a hair dryer, or another safe source. Never use an open flame.
- 4. Need help? If you're unsure of what to do or can't find the frozen pipe, give us a call.

# Holiday Recycling

The holidays may be over, but you Christmas Trees: can continue to give by recycling your Christmas tree, holiday lights, cardboard boxes, gift wrap, and batteries with Greene County Environmental Services.

#### **Cardboard and Gift Wrap:**

Recycle cardboard boxes and gift wrap with your curbside recycling or at Environmental Services. Break down boxes. For gift wrap, only paper is accepted—no foil, ribbons, or bows.

## String Lights:

Recycle holiday string lights. Do not put them in your regular curbside recyclingthey will cause tangles. Bring in your old or burnt out lights directly to our facility for proper recycling.

Drop off your tree at Environmental Services. Please remove all lights, decorations, and the stand. Bagged or wrapped trees cannot be accepted.

#### **Batteries:**

Recycle household batteries. Do not put them in your curbside recycling—they will cause fires. Bring batteries directly to Environmental Services for proper recycling.

# Where does my recycled paper go?

Paper and cardboard are the most recycled material in the United States. They are vital to the circular economy, remaining cornerstones of the recycling stream. With e-commerce driving an increase in cardboard, these materials continue to play a crucial role. Greene County Environmental Services has a 99.9% material recovery rate with paper and cardboard—keeping the items you recycle out of landfills! They supply recycled paper and cardboard directly to paper mills in Ohio and Kentucky. By recycling paper, you are supporting new products, creating local jobs, and conserving resources.

Accepted paper items for recycling:

- Cardboard: break down boxes, remove plastic packaging materials, labels can stay on
- Newspapers, magazines, telephone books, and catalogs
- Office paper and envelopes
- Paperboard: cereal boxes
- Pizza boxes: free of food and grease
- Paper cups, fast food beverage cups, coffee cups: without straws and lids
- Cartons: milk, juice, and soup cartons, remove caps and straws

# **New Billing Rates**

Greene County Sanitary Engineering operates like a private business, funding all water and wastewater services through user charges—no tax dollars involved. New water and sewer rates will go into effect January 1, 2025. There will be a 3.5% inflationary increase in the water and a 1% decrease in the sewer. For the average residential customer using 7,500 gallons per month, this means a net increase of \$1.01 per month.
